What We Can Celebrate

My eye caught a glimpse of a student walking with a pronounced limp down the village school's hallway past the principal's office where we were having tea. His gait seemed familiar – so we asked to have the boy come in. We realized it was Amriddin whom we'd filmed 6 years earlier for a video prompting inclusive education. He just finished 9th grade in June. His progress is just one example of community partnership bringing hope to a youth! We know this only because of being present in the same community over time. We hope that the boy will follow in his older brother (who also has a physical disability) and pursue further education.

I hope you've heard the news: I'm ending my service in Central Asia later this year. One reason that I have peace in leaving is that two local managers have grown so much. Mrs. Fair is an exceptional teacher who can mentor people and plan projects. Mr. Pat can manage a budget, do PR with a cranky government official, or talk kinds with a teen with a learning disability. Both were talented young staff in 2004 when I arrived, and became managers within a few years. I, along with others, have mentored them since 2008. They have the capacity to continue to a well-selected group of projects – serving local communities of often excluded rural women or persons with disabilities! I thank God for their gifts, their compassion, and their growth – and pray that God will bless their work!

Looking back over 15 years of service in Central Asia with Presbyterian World Mission (PWM): The people, prayers, and provisions have come together again & again – guided by the Holy Spirit, people acted in faith and petitioned God for me to go half way around the world and to stay; generous folks provided funds for projects and God filled in whatever else was necessary for efforts to have a positive impact. The energy from you while sharing the stories over the years as I've come back to the USA periodically – all are signs of God's hand at work in Central Asia and among US Presbyterians!

Lets' pause, be grateful and celebrate all this: Amriddin still in school; my two local colleagues continuing the work; and partners like you still engaged with PWM's work around the world. Amen. Youth Aim to Pack 25,000 Meals for the Hungry

PASTORS' LETTER



Dear Friends,

We know it to be true that words matter. Words matter in how we speak and in what we write. It is also true that context matters. Context shapes understanding of what we hear and what we read. We know that in the church perhaps better than most because we pay such close attention to the words and context of scripture. The Bible is central to our faith and informs

our everyday living as scripture deepens our faith in God.

Given the recent destructive hurricanes, building-crumbling earthquakes, flying missiles, frightening nuclear tests, threats of war, political rancor at home and abroad, and all that is going on very personally in our lives, scripture again points us to the source of our ultimate trust and hope. God. Of course, God.

Psalm 46 is an especially important psalm for me. Its words matter. Its context matters. I encourage you to read the whole psalm. From the opening verses "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" to the concluding verses of trust in God, it is a powerful psalm. One of the most familiar verses (46.10a) says, be still and know that I am God. Words and context matter. The Hebrew word that has so often been translated "be still" isn't a particularly good translation. Too often that has been understood as a sense of meditation or contemplation. Nothing wrong with mediation or contemplation, for sure. But biblical scholar J. Clinton McCann, Jr. suggests that perhaps a better translation would be "Stop!" Stop! and know that I am God.

Stop! and know that I am God. Words matter and context matters. The preceding verse (46.9) says this, (God) makes wars cease to the ends of the earth; he breaks the bow and shatters the spear; he burns the shields with fire. Who is more powerful than the most powerful army on earth? God. Who has the ability to change human hearts and end wars? God. Who can bring forth a future we can't imagine? God.

Stop! and know that I am God. In other words, McCann says, "Depend on God instead of yourselves." Important words from scripture that speak to our very lives. My prayer for all of us is that we trust God's faithful love for us and for the world. *Stop! and know that I am God.*

CHEF KATIE'S RECIPE CORNER

Here's the recipe for the entree served at the September All Church Brunch. Katie Seelye, FPC's Director of Food Service and Hospitality, also prepared this in a demo that day. Enjoy cooking at home!

Beef Sirloin with Wild Mushrooms and Vegetables

Ingredients:

1 lb. beef sirloin, trimmed/cubed
1/2 tsp. salt, divided
1/2 tsp. freshly ground pepper
Flour, as needed for coating beef
1 tsp. vegetable oil
2 garlic cloves, minced
7 oz. wild mushrooms, thinly sliced
1/2 cup dry red wine
1/2 cup beef broth, divided
2 cups mixed vegetables, frozen

Instructions:

Sprinkle sirloin evenly with 1/4 tsp. pepper and 1/4 tsp. salt and flour, set aside.

Heat oil in a large non-stick skillet over medium-high heat. Add sirloin, cook 1-2 minutes on each side or until browned on each side. Remove from pan and set aside.

Reduce heat to medium; add garlic and mushrooms. Saute 2 minutes. Add wine, 1/2 cup broth, remaining salt and pepper. Increase heat to medium-high and cook 7 minutes, stirring occasionally and scraping pan to loosen browned bits.

Return sirloin to pan and cook 5-7 minutes or until thoroughly heated.

Makes 4 servings.

Cookies Needed for Prison Ministry

Homemade cookies are a tangible expression of love! Kairos Prison Ministry needs 30 dozen cookies for the Mountain View Women's Prison Retreat October 19-22. **Cookies are needed by October 18 in the church office.**

Chocolate chip, oatmeal, peanut butter, and those made from cake mixes are all favorites! Here are some guidelines to please keep in mind.

- Cookies should be between 2 and 2 1/2" in diameter and not over 1/2" thick. (Over or undersized cookies can be used, just bag and label separately.)
- Do Not Use: Icing or any other topping or decoration on the outside of the cookies (including sugar).
- Do Not Use: Any fruits, nuts, raisins, M&Ms or coconut. Flavored chips are ok (chocolate, butterscotch, etc.)
- COOL each cookie thoroughly! Cookies packed even slightly warm will stick together, are difficult to separate, and tend to break easily.
- PACK the cooled cookies in quart zip lock freezer bags (not the "slide zipper" type) in groups of 12. Cookies are best protected from breaking if they're stacked inside the flat zip lock in 2 layers of 6 cookies. If the cookies will not be turned over to your Kairos contact within 3 days, you may freeze the cookies to preserve freshness.
- PRAY individually, as a family, or as a group as you prepare the pack the cookies. Ask God to use your cookies as a source of God's love for the inmates during the weekend and that participants will become part of the family of God.

5 Things I Didn't Expect at a FPC Session Meeting

When Michael Waschevski, my supervisor, suggested I find a Session meeting to attend sometime this year, I was on board but not particularly excited. Don't get me wrong – I very much see the importance of committee meetings within the church. Meetings allow us to plan ministry, evaluate events, brainstorm future possibilities, and get to know one another better. But maybe you're like me and imagine the Session to be a stoic room full of quiet church leaders listening to a rap sheet of motions and reports from a lengthy and formal docket.

However, when I attended the September 17 meeting of the FPC Session, my experience was quiet different than I imagined. Maybe you've made your own assumptions, too. Here are five things I didn't expect at a FPC Session meeting.

- 1. I didn't expect to cry. Each Session meeting opens with a devotion given by a Session member. At September's meeting, Herd Midkiff delivered an emotionally moving devotion about the power of faith, hope, and love in the midst of tragedy. His heartfelt words follow the loss of his wife and FPC member Shannon in early 2016. My own tears mixed with those around the room; it was a moving and sacred moment.
- 2. I didn't expect to laugh. Michelle Goodwin, chair of the Property Committee, reported on the committee's work this year that includes a great deal of exterior building cleaning and renovation, or as she aptly named it, "2017: The Year of Drone Readiness." This is in response to a video the church received months ago from someone in the community who flew their drone over the church, exposing a telling visual of unsightly stains

on our roofs! The Session erupted in laughter at Michelle's clever humor. FPC is now "drone ready"!

- 3. I didn't expect to witness teamwork. FPC is approaching its annual emphasis on stewardship. Mary Kay Roberto, chair of the Stewardship Committee, came to the Session meeting with hundreds of invitations to upcoming Generosity Gatherings. Members of your session teamed up to hand address and stuff these invitations. When you receive yours in the mail, know it was touched by and prayed over by your thoughtful Session.
- 4. I didn't expect to be inspired. At each Session meeting, reports are made on the progress of church projects, programs, and goals. Amy Parker, Director of Children's Ministry and Outreach, delivered a report on the Prairie Valley Camp Fund, which FPC now manages – telling the Session about the 105 children and youth from our Presbytery and region who were able to attend camps on scholarships totaling \$25,000. So inspiring!
- 5. I didn't expect to want to go back. Within my capacity as Director of Communications, I am always welcome at Session meetings. But before the suggestion from Michael, I hadn't considered the full value of doing so. Since my office hours tend to be during the week, attending this Sunday Session meeting felt a little bit like a chore. I now feel very differently. Given the chance again, I'd consider the opportunity to watch FPC's elders and staff in action a true honor and privilege.
