# How Presbyterians Make Decisions

This is the second article in a four-part series. Part one appeared in the May 16 Penn Street Online.

Beginning last week and continuing for three weeks the *Penn Street Letter* and the *Penn Street Online* will feature a series of articles on decision making within our denomination - the Presbyterian Church (USA). The Session

is particularly interested that every member of First Presbyterian Church understands how we make decisions together. This week's article focuses on the Presbyterian principle of making decisions in gathered bodies. The governing bodies of the Presbyterian Church (USA) are called councils. The councils of the church include sessions, presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly. This insistence upon shared decision making comes from two theological observations. First, we are cautious about investing too much authority in a single individual. Second, we believe that the Holy Spirit is vibrantly available to gathered Christians.

Sessions are comprised of elected Ruling Elders and installed ministers (Ministers of Word and Sacrament) of a local congregation. Each congregation sets the size of its session and elects its own Ruling Elders. First Presbyterian Church of Fort Worth established the session at between 45-48 Ruling Elders. (The range accounts for the possibility of electing up to three elders under the age of 21.) Ruling Elders are elected by the congregation to three year terms unless elected to fill an unexpired term. Joining the elected Ruling Elders as members of session are the four installed pastors, having been called by the congregation.

Presbyteries are regional units of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Presbyteries vary in size (member congregations and geography). Our presbytery, Grace, is one of the largest in the denomination in both number of congregations and geographical territory. Grace Presbytery includes over 150 congregations of which First Presbyterian Church of Fort Worth is one of the largest. The presbytery extends north to the Oklahoma border, south to Salado, east to the Louisiana border, and west to Mineral Wells.

Grace Presbytery meets several times each year. The voting membership of Grace Presbytery includes Ruling Elder Commissioners from each session and all minister members of the presbytery. Sessions elect from one to seven Ruling Elder Commissioners based on church membership. Our session elects four commissioners for each meeting. Additionally our four installed pastors vote as members of Grace Presbytery. In addition to all minister members of Grace Presbytery and Ruling Elder Commissioners elected by Sessions, Ruling Elders serving on presbytery committees are granted voice and vote as are Ruling Elder commissioners to the previous General Assembly and Associate Certified and Certified Christian Educators who are Ruling Elders. This allows Grace Presbytery to work towards the goal of "numerical parity of teaching elders (ministers) and ruling elders." (Book of Order

G-3.0301)

Synods are larger regional bodies comprised of presbyteries. Synods are composed of Ruling Elder commissioners and Minister Commissioners from each presbytery in numerical parity. Grace Presbytery is a part of the Synod of the Sun.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) is the national gathering of our denomination. Meeting every two years, the General Assembly is comprised of Ruling Elder commissioners and Minister Commissioners elected by each presbytery based upon membership. The General Assembly, like the synods, is required to have numerical parity between Ruling Elders and Ministers.

Whether serving on a local session or as a commissioner to a higher governing body, all Ruling Elders and Ministers are collectively referred to as presbyters. As the Form of Government states, "Presbyters are not simply to reflect the will of the people, but rather to seek together to find and represent the will of Christ." (F-3.0204) This is an important –and often misunderstood – role. Presbyters do not serve as elected representatives of a constituency. When presbyters gather they spiritually discern as followers of Jesus Christ. Studying and interpreting scripture, being guided by our Book of Confessions, prayer, and dialog lead presbyters to their decisions on how to vote on the business before the church council on which they are serving. "Decisions are reached in councils by majority vote, following an opportunity for discussion and discernment, and a majority shall govern." (F-3.0205)

As can be seen from this brief review of councils and decision making, Presbyterians practice a polity that shares decision making between Ruling Elders and Ministers. Sessions are always comprised of more Ruling Elders than Ministers. Presbyteries seek parity between Ruling Elders and Ministers. (In reality Ruling Elders frequently outnumber Ministers at presbytery meetings.) At synods and the General Assembly numerical parity is mandated. Regardless of whether one is a Ruling elder or a Minister, together these presbyters take seriously their responsibility to prayerfully seek the will of Christ in their decisions. While not all presbyters agree on decisions reached, Presbyterian polity allows for voices to be heard, open and respectful debate, and an affirmation that God's spirit works in and through the community of faith.

Next week's article will examine how the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (USA) - Book of Confessions and the Book of Order - may be amended. A selected item of business for the General Assembly meeting this summer in St. Louis will be illustrative of the processes involved in amending our Constitution.

Dear Friends,

Part of my project will be the design of a curriculum that I will use with volunteers at Community Crossroads in the hopes of enhancing self-understanding and interpersonal empathy as we interact with neighbors. This project is deeply grounded in theological understandings of mission which are themselves deeply grounded in the nature and character of God who is with us. I am so grateful to serve in a congregation so deeply committed to compassion and outreach ministries, and my hope is that this concentrated time on my project will deepen and enrich our reflection and action as we serve God together in our community and beyond.

Also, like many of you, this summer I will enjoy time with my family and find ways to nurture my faith. What a gift this sabbatical will be. Please know of my gratitude for such an opportunity. It's not a gift deserved, for then it would cease to be a gift, but it is a gift much appreciated. May each of us find spaces for renewal that enrich our lives together in our continued ministry together.

# Reflections on our Cuba Partnership Pilgrimage



Six church members (Jacqueline Bender, Grant Garlington, Russell and Sarah Haddock, Cheryl Mireles, and Robyn Michalove) traveled to Cuba for seven days in mid-April to renew the partnership between our congregation and three sister Presbyterian-Reformed congregations in the Presbytery of Matanzas in western Cuba. The purpose of the partnership is to affirm and build on the unity of the Presbyterian Church under Jesus Christ through a mutual exchange of people, Christian education and Bible study, cultural understanding and, at times, financial support. Presbyterians have a historic connection to the church in Cuba, and over 50 US Presbyterian congregations and presbyteries have partnerships with Cuban congregations. This was our third trip to Cuba in our current partnership and on this trip our church members visited the seminary in Matanzas and met with eight Presbyterian seminarians as well as the two PC(USA) mission coworkers that our congregational financially supports. Here's a piece of a reflection from trip participant, Sarah Haddock:

"In my experience the Presbyterian community in Cuba celebrate life joyfully, fully engaged in the moment. They are generous and full of hospitality. They do not complain about their circumstances, struggles and oppression. For them it is a way of life and they roll with it. They have a spirit that is contagious. There is a zest to pursue their relationship with Jesus Christ and this seems pure and untainted by the modern pressure of materialism...We may have left 11 bags of supplies in Cuba and came home with half-filled bags, but I know truly what I came home with will forever have changed me and it has so much more value than what was left behind."
