ALL SAINTS' DAY SPECIAL SERVICE

First Presbyterian Church gathers for worship on Thursday, November 1 at 7 p.m. to celebrate All Saints' Day. Led by the clergy and the Chancel Choir, this service of scripture, music, prayer, and the Lord's Supper is among the most moving of our worship services offered each year. During the service First Presbyterian members who have died in the past year will be remembered by name as a bell is tolled. The Chancel Choir will offer several inspiring anthems based on early American melodies. The service concludes with the celebration of the Lord's Supper as we so powerfully remember the communion of saints that surrounds us now and eternally.

All Saints' Day was established as an opportunity to honor all the saints, remembered and forgotten, known and unknown. It has been celebrated on or around November 1 since the ninth century.... In the Reformed tradition, the emphasis on this festival is the on-going sanctification of the whole people of God. While we may give thanks for the lives of particular luminaries of ages past, we also give glory to God for the ordinary, holy lives of believers in this and every age. Make plans to attend this special service as we join in praising God for those who have gone before us and for one another as we seek to be faithful dispciples of Jesus Christ.

PASTORS' LETTER

Dear Friends,

As the calendar turns to November, the darkness comes a little earlier in the evening (don't forget the time change on November 4), the weather a little colder, the holidays a little closer. For some,

this time of year comes with a mix of emotions as folks balance dynamics in families – sometimes coupled with grief for what has been and sometimes met with fatigue for what lies ahead. Added to that, we experience in our society extraordinary tensions of difference and division politically, racially, economically.

And it is in these moments that the church calendar pulls us back together to recall our shared connection in Christ and the deep-rooted hope we share. We begin the month celebrating All Saints' Day, a very ancient festival in the history of the church. The people of God have always valued memory; the scriptures abound with recollections of God's faithfulness. Walter Brueggemann calls it deep memory. People from all places and times have walked on as God's people, seeking to be faithful to the God whom we trust. And though each generation has had their own unique contributions to the journey, the race remains the same: how to be faithful and keep our eyes on Jesus (Hebrews 12.2). Our deep memory is connected to our exuberant hope – that God who began a good work in us will be faithful to complete it (Philippians 1.6). No matter the season of life we experience, our hope is in Christ, who gives us strength to trust God with all who we are. We remember. We hope.

And, in our memory and in our hope, we give thanks. While Thanksgiving is not a liturgical holiday per se, we celebrate the abundance of God's provision in the world. God's bounty overflows and we participate in it through our sharing of it. Gratitude is a supreme spiritual practice that draws us into the heart of a God who gives graciously and extravagantly.

The last Sunday in November is Christ the King Sunday, and we end the month recognizing the lordship of Christ who is head of the church, despite all that threatens to divide us as God's people. We remember. We hope. We give thanks. We trust in Christ who is making all things new.

May the month of November shape our discipleship beyond mere calendar days to see the scope of God's kingdom among us, breaking through, even in the ordinary.

MYTH 2: Volunteers have to stay the entire duration of Room in the Inn. FACT: Volunteers can serve at times that fit their schedules. And, this ministry is perfect for those who are unable to volunteer during daytime hours because of their work schedule! We need volunteers to prepare the beds Monday afternoon, offer hospitality Monday evening, and wash laundry and write thank you cards on their own time.

MYTH 3: Homelessness is on the decline in our community.

FACT: Those experiencing homelessness in Fort Worth increased by 17% from 2017. Room in the Inn provides a needed ministry in our community. especially during times of extreme weather conditions when shelter beds are overflowing.
