## PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends,

In just a matter of weeks we once again make the journey of Holy Week. From the waving of palms to shouts of "crucify him!" to the proclamation "he is risen!", the Holy Week journey is a rich experience of the height, depth and breadth of God's love made known in Jesus Christ. The richness is most deeply experienced by engaging the journey from beginning to end. Palm Sunday (April 14), Maundy Thursday (April 18), Good Friday (April 19) and Easter Sunday (April 21.) Midday prayer services are also held on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of Holy Week. A full schedule of services, including a new service geared toward children on Maundy Thursday, is included in this edition of the *Penn Street Letter*.

We have been preparing for Holy Week and Easter throughout Lent as Midday prayers offered reflections on the cross. A central image of Holy Week is the cross. As you conclude your own spiritual preparation for Holy Week and Easter, the words of Isaac Watts may voice a prayer for you. The Chancel Choir will sing them as Palm Sunday worship nears its end. On Good Friday we will sing this hymn together at the conclusion of the noon service. In the remaining time of Lent, may they form your own prayer as we prepare to enter the Holy Week journey once again.

When I survey the wondrous cross on which the Prince of glory died; my richest gain I count but loss, and pour contempt on all my pride.

Forbid it Lord, that I should boast, save in the death of Christ my God; all the vain things that charm me most, I sacrifice them to his blood.

See, from his head, his hands, his feet, sorrow and love flowed mingled down; did e'er such love and sorrow meet, or thorns compose so rich a crown?

Were the whole realm of nature mine, that were a present far too small; love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all.


## HONORING 50+ YEAR MEMBERS

## Trinity Habitat celebrates 30th Anniversary

This year marks the 30th anniversary of Trinity Habitat for Humanity (Trinity Habitat). First Presbyterian Church (FPC) has been a partner with Trinity Habitat from the beginning. FPC built our 25th and 50th houses on our parking lot and we even built a few houses at Mayfest. In May, we will celebrate the 90th house that we have partnered with Habitat to build.

Since Trinity Habitat's inception in 1989, 1,891 families have been served – 697 homes built, 1,150 Preserve a Home projects completed and 44 Disaster Relief projects completed. It is important to remember Habitat for Humanity is a Hand Up, not a Hand Out, is a foundation for a better life and is community driven. Last year Trinity Habitat homes paid a total of \$720,000 to the City of Fort Worth in property taxes.

There are many steps and criteria that a prospective homeowner needs to meet and agree to become a Habitat homeowner. So how does someone become a homeowner of a Habitat home?

#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

The Mission Outreach Committee is proud to let the FPC congregation know where our Mission dollars are going. In January of each year, FPC disburses a large portion of the annual commitments. In January 2019, these disbursements included:

- The first \$12,000 of our \$132,000 commitment to Presbyterian Night Shelter.
- The first \$30,000 installment of our \$1,000,000 (over 3 years) commitment to the capital campaign for PNS Men's shelter.
- The first \$6,000 of our \$12,000 commitment to the James L. West Center Senior Adult Daycare Program.
- The first \$9,000 of our \$90,000 commitment to Habitat for Humanity.
- The first \$7,500 of our \$15,000 gift to Tarrant Churches Together.
- \$5,000 to the Pan American Schreiner Scholarship.
- \$1,350 of our \$13,500 commitment to South Central Alliance of Churches
- \$5,000 for the Presbyterian Pan American School.
- The first \$5,500 of our \$22,000 commitment for Living Water International.
- \$3,500 for the Camp Fire Camp El Tesoro summer camperships.
- \$5,500 towards our \$11,000 commitment to the Presbyterian Studies Program at Brite Divinity School.
- \$5,000 towards our \$10,000 commitment for United Community Centers.
- \$11,800 to Austin College for our commitment to the Moseley Scholarship and the Spring Break endowment (\$200,000 over 4 years).
- \$1,200 to Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary towards our \$12,000 commitment towards scholarship.
