NEW PNS MEN'S SHELTER D BE NAMED "KARL TRAVIS MEN'S CEN

In April, the Session celebrated a \$1 million dollar gift that was approved in December 2018 to Presbyterian Night Shelter for renovations to its' men's shelter and for improvements and enhancements to the larger campus. This gift will be given over a 3 year period and is over and above our annual mission giving to PNS.

At the invitation of Presbyterian Night Shelter, FPC was given the opportunity of renaming the new men's building. The Session has requested that the building be renamed the "Karl Travis Men's Center."

The images at right show an architect's rendering of what the new men's building will look like. Karl continues to serve on the Board of PNS and as an advocate for the homeless in Tarrant County.

History of PNS

When a homeless man froze to death under a bridge in downtown Fort Worth in 1984, a group of Presbyterian ministers began to talk about a solution so that the same would not occur to other homeless people. From this grew the idea of a temporary shelter of refuge. Beginning first in the James. E. Guinn Elementary School as a "situp shelter", the need grew quickly enough to necessitate a larger building. which was built in 1984 at 2400 Cypress and was named "The Presbyterian Night Shelter."

Originally, it was conceived to be just another night shelter for the homeless and would be available at no cost - 24 hours, seven days a week.

Over time, additional care functions have been added, including comprehensive individual case management and housing assistance, with the goal of ending homelessness and positively impacting the Tarrant County community.

A warm place to sleep was a blessing for some 280 homeless people on a cold December night in 1987.

In 1997, Presbyterian Night Shelter was spun off from the founding churches as an independent legal entity. It was incorporated under the Texas Non-Profit Act and is recognized as a 501(c)(3) organization.

By 2013, PNS hosted 600+ guests every night of the year.

Today, PNS supplies meals, beds and human care services to more than 5,000 individuals annually. The organization maintains an over 40,000-square-foot facility. Presbyterian Night Shelter offers counseling and case management services. It provides identification, permanent housing, employment, and financial assistance solutions. The organization serves adults with mental illnesses and conducts work therapy programs. It provides help in retrieving documentation, as well as life skills and parenting classes, health education, and goal planning assistance.

The organization works in partnership with the Veterans Administration.

- The PNS website lists these Emergency Shelter Facts:
- As a no-barrier facility, we welcome anyone who needs US.
- We're the only free shelter in our area without lengthof-stay restrictions.
- We're open 24 hours per day, 365 days per year. •
- Our campus includes a shelter that houses homeless adults, with separate facilities for families (women and their children), veterans and those with behavioral disabilities.
- In addition to housing, our emergency shelter services include warm meals, access to bathroom and shower facilities, toiletries, emergency clothing and more.

For Tarrant County's homeless population, emergency shelter is just the first step. PNS is dedicated to helping guests move into their own homes, and helps them get there with housing assistance that includes job training, employment assistance, life-skills education and much more. Within the past 5 years, a large warehouse was built across the street which houses donations of clothing, household items, furniture, etc. When residents are ready to transition into permanent housing, their assigned case worker can come to the warehouse and choose furnishings and supplies to help an individual or a family get started in a new home.

Session Approves Contribution to Karl B. Travis Scholarship Fund

On April 28, 2019 the Session honored the Rev. Karl Travis by making a \$10,000 contribution to the Karl B. Travis Scholarship Fund of Grace Presbytery.

Grace Presbytery Council established this fund in honor of Karl Travis' ministry within Grace Presbytery upon the occasion of his unexpected medical disability in early 2019.

The Council has funded the account with an initial \$15,000 and invites other congregations and individuals, both in Grace Presbytery and beyond, to contribute as well. Karl had been a member of Presbytery Council, and had been elected moderator of the Council for 2019, and then had to resign from that position.

Karl has been known as a stalwart Presbyterian, a guru for stewardship strategies for multi-generations, a teacher of generational theory and its applicability in congregational life. Further, he is an outstanding preacher and a resilient and powerful colleague in ministry to many both at First Presbyterian Church, Fort Worth, and beyond.

The purpose of this fund is to provide scholarship assistance to one or more seminarians who show promise for congregational ministry with excellence in preaching. Preference will be given to Grace Presbytery candidates for ministry from First Fort Worth, but also to the wider number of candidates in the presbytery. Guidelines for applications and the decision-making process are being developed by the Council.

Youth Partner Trip to Cuba: June 6-14, 2019

On June 6, twenty-one members of our church (14 youth and 7 adults) will travel to Cuba for nine days as part of our church partnership with three congregations in the province of Matanzas. They will participate in worship and ministries of the three churches, visit our two PC(USA) coworkers at the seminary (pictured above), see the new water filtration system at one of our partner churches that we helped fund through Living Waters for the World, attend an overnight youth retreat and visit a Presbyterian congregation in Havana. This is our fifth trip to Cuba since our partnership began in 2015.

The purpose of the partnership is to affirm and build on the unity of the Presbyterian Church under Jesus Christ through a mutual exchange of people, Christian education and Bible study, cultural understanding and, at times, financial support. Presbyterians have a historic connection to the church in Cuba, and over 50 US Presbyterian congregations and presbyteries have partnerships with Cuban congregations. One of our partner churches pastors, Liz Eleyne Capó Lima, will come to FPCFW in June, after attending the Cuba Partners Network conference with three of our church members (Jacqueline Bender, Rachel Garlington and Kristin Glass) at Loyola University in New Orleans. We look forward to welcoming Pastor Liz on her first trip to the United States.

Learn the Language of Love

A Summer Offering from the Spiritual Formation Committee

Marshall B. Rosenberg, PhD, the founder and world-wide teacher and practitioner of Nonviolent Communication (NVC) states: "If violence means acting in ways that result in hurt or harm, then much of how we communicate – judging, bullying, blaming, discriminating, speaking without listening, diagnosing, criticizing, correcting, name-calling, reacting when angry, using political rhetoric, becoming defensive – could indeed be called 'violent communication."

If you are experiencing challenging relationships at home or work and are looking for a better way to relate, or if you are concerned about the level of violence in our country and our seeming inability to converse with someone who holds very different political, religious, or social viewpoints - without falling into 'violent communication' patterns ourselves - join Martha Newman and Carol Toombs this summer to become part of the solution.

Using Rosenberg's book, *Nonviolent Communication: A Language* of *Life*, we will learn the basics of his process and will spend a lot of time practicing it. As Rosenberg admits NVC is deceptively simple, but difficult to do, since we have been so well taught in the ways of verbal violence.
