David LaMotte is coming to FPC for a concert with special guest Wes Collins on Thursday, August 15 at 7 p.m. in the Great Hall. This concert is free and open to the public.

David LaMotte is an award-winning songwriter, speaker, author, and activist. He has produced 12 CDs and performed 2500 concerts on 5 continents. The *Boston Globe* says he "pushes the envelope with challenging lyrics and unusual tunings, but he also pays homage to folk tradition," while *BBC Radio* praises his "charm, stories, humour, insightful songs, sweet voice and dazzling guitar ability."

He suspended his music career in 2008 to accept a Rotary World Peace Fellowship, earning a master's degree in International Studies, Peace, and Conflict Resolution from the University of Queensland in Brisbane, Australia, and working in rural India as part of that degree.

David maintains a dense calendar of speaking and musical events worldwide. He also serves as the president of PEG Partners, the non-profit organization he co-founded to support schools and libraries in Guatemala. In addition to that, he serves as the Clerk (chair) of the Nobel Peace Prize Nominating Task Group for the AFSC (Quakers).

His most recent endeavor is as one-third of the interfaith trio Abraham Jam, whose debut album was released in July 2019.

PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

With the 50th anniversary of the Apollo mission in July, I thought of other historic events that also commemorate fifty years in 2019. While I wasn't alive then, I know how profoundly 1969 shaped our psyche and culture. As one person says, "The swinging sixties quivered with change. A chain of famous events in 1969 would change the world for the good and bad, leaving its mark in history as one of the most culturally defining years to date."

Think back with me... in 1969 ...we remember Nixon's inauguration, the Vietnam War and all of the protests, the deadly riots in Malaysia, the conflicts in Northern Ireland, the first Woodstock, Charles Manson murders, the first person lands and walks on the moon. Also that year, the Beatles release their last album and perform their last concert; the *Saturday Evening Post* is retired after 100 years of publication; the Boeing 747 makes it debut as well as the first ever Concorde test flight launches; the first temporary artificial heart is implanted; and the first person reaches the North Pole after crossing the frozen surface of the Arctic Ocean on foot. In 1969, the Stonewall Riots begin in New York City, at the beginning of the Gay Rights Movement, and the trials of the murders of RFK and MLK take place. The Black Panther Movement gains momentum. On a much lighter note, but near and dear to my heart, the *Brady Bunch* premiers its first episode.

Did you also know that in July 1969 the Rev. Elizabeth (Betsy) Johnson Pense was ordained and installed at First Presbyterian Church? She was the first Presbyterian clergywoman ordained in North Texas and the ninth woman ordained in the Presbyterian Church, U.S. Betsy has served the church faithfully in these five decades, and we are especially thankful for her ministry at First Presbyterian. We give thanks for all the ways in which she responds to God's call, and I, as a fellow clergywoman, am particularly grateful for her leadership.

The events of our world are ever changing, and many of the things that we experience, like in 1969, can be tumultuous and difficult. And, also, during every moment God is present and working in the church through people like you and Betsy and me to share God's light, Christ's love, and the Holy Spirit's companionship. May it be so with all of us!

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ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING CELEBRATES 70 YEARS

Have you ever wondered, when you get those inserts and those envelopes in the bulletin, what One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) is all about? Do you wonder where and when it started, or where your donations go?

Well, the Presbyterian Mission Board has some answers and has published some interesting information in celebration of this, the 70th anniversary of One Great Hour of Sharing, an ecumenical effort to help relieve human suffering around the world.

HISTORY

The first offering was promoted via a national radio broadcast on the Saturday evening prior to Easter in 1949. A host of famous people participated in the program, including President Harry Truman and actors Gregory Peck and Ida Lupino.

Truman opened the "One Great Hour" broadcast by urging listeners to "build a new world, a far better world" in which the dignity of all humanity would be respected. The name of the radio program was adopted into the name of the offering the following year, and it became known as the One Great Hour of Sharing.

The day after the broadcast, on Easter Sunday, the OGHS offering was received for the first time. It brought much needed aid to people reeling from the destruction of World War II, which had ended just four years earlier. The Presbyterian Church joined other mainline Protestant denominations as well as Anglican and Orthodox communities in this effort.

In the 1960's, the scope of One Great Hour of Sharing was expanded to include both national and international needs.

The offering has continued to be received every year since. Today gifts received in PC(USA) congregations support Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program and Self-Development of People ministries.

For many Presbyterians and other Christians, stories related to the work of OGHS have become an integral part of their Lenten observance. The OGHS tradition has continued in part because it has included an emphasis on involving children. Generations of Sunday School children have learned about stewardship and mission support by putting coins into fish banks.

While most congregations receive the offering on Palm Sunday or Easter Sunday, it can be received at any time. Last year Presbyterian gifts to OGHS topped \$6 million, an increase of more than 7.5 percent over 2017. After several years of decrease, 2018 marked the second year in a row that OGHS gifts increased over the previous year.

TYPES OF SPECIAL OFFERINGS

Today, there are four special offerings, promoted and collected at four specific events during the year.

- enten Offering In keeping with tradition, the main OGHS offering is received during the Season of Lent. (This year on April 14 and April 21). It provides relief to those affected by disasters, food for the hungry, and support toward the self-development of poor and oppressed countries.
- entecost Offering The second is on Pentecost (usually late May or early June). This offering unites us in a church wide effort to support young people by inspiring them to share their faith, ideas, and unique gifts with the church and the world and to build a life of faith. The offering serves to nurture all children, youth, and young adults, locally and around the world.
- eace and Global Witness This offering is received during what is commonly called the Season of Peace (usually late September or early October). It benefits Peacemaking and Reconciliation efforts within cultures of violence and conflict including our own. The offering encourages us to cast off fear and anxiety and embrace God's boundless peace available to all.
- Christmas Joy Offering During the Season of Advent, we receive this offering usually on Christmas Eve. During this season, we celebrate the gift of our church leaders past, present, and future. We want church leaders and their families who find themselves grappling with critical financial need to receive assistance. Fifty percent of the offering is used to provide opportunities for Communities of Color through the leadership development efforts of the Racial Equity Office of the Presbyterian Mission Agency. The other 50 % provides financial assistance through the Board of Pensions, for current and retired Presbyterian clergy and church workers in their time of need.

"For 70 years, gifts from One Great Hour of Sharing have enabled our church and other churches to make a difference for people in distress", said Bryce Wiebe, director of Special Offerings for the PC(USA). "Lives are changed thanks to the generous people who give each year to OGHS. We are grateful for every person who gives."

FOLLOW ME: 'Jesus and NonViolence' Group Forming



Richard Rohr has suggested that most of us just don't get it. He claims that we worship Jesus but are reluctant to follow him; and yet, as he points out, "Jesus never once says, 'Worship me!' whereas he frequently says, 'Follow me." So, what would that look like if we did?

Walter Wink and others teach that a crucial piece of following Jesus, and of becoming 'a new being in Christ,' is to adopt the nonviolent lifestyle he preached and lived. In his book, *Jesus*

and Nonviolence: A Third Way, Wink expands our understanding of what is meant by nonviolence and traces how Jesus, Gandhi, and King all practiced this courageous, loving, faithful way of addressing injustice and the violence it spawns.

Following Jesus could transform us, our relationships, and the world we live in!

A group will form this fall to study nonviolence, using Wink's book among others. We will covenant together to meet on Sunday afternoons from 1 p.m. until 3:30 p.m. starting on October 6 and continuing for eight weeks through November 24. We will take a deeper look at the Gospels and at Jesus' example. We will pray together, speak from the heart, learn from the wisdom of our authors and one another, and support one another in our personal growth.

In a world that is too quick to support rhetoric that divides us from one another, participating in a group that cultivates genuine dialogue, contemplative prayer, and community could be an antidote for personal frustration and, in time, become part of the healing of the world.

Over the past several years, over 200 adult members and friends of First Presbyterian Church have completed the Reading the Bible in 9 Months program developed by Associate Pastor Michael Waschevski. Daily readings from September - May are arranged in such a way that the connections between the books of the Bible and the overarching themes and story cycles of scripture come together to reveal the unity of the Bible.

Monthly gatherings are offered for those who would like to come together to support and encourage one another in the discipline of daily reading, and to ask questions raised from the readings. The reading plan and schedule for monthly meetings for the 2019-2020 Reading the Bible in 9 Months will be posted on the First Presbyterian website and Facebook pages near the end of August. Reading plans will also be available at the Mission and Ministry Kick-Off Celebration Sunday, August 25.

What is the Difference between Stephen Ministry and Sustaining Care?

Stephen Ministry is a lay caregiving program pioneered by Dr. Kenneth Haugk, a Lutheran minister and clinical psychologist, in the 1970's. FPC is an early adopter of Stephen Ministry with an active program dating from the 1980's that continues to thrive today. There are over 100 trained Stephen Ministers among our membership.

The traditional Stephen Ministry model is designed for care receivers who have experienced a crisis or loss. Trained caregivers work through the issue with them over several months or longer during which time they participate in regular supervision and continuing education-- generally working continuously with their care receivers until the issue is resolved. Initial Stephen Ministry training, supervision and continuing education activities focus on Jesus as the ultimate caregiver. Other important skills include active listening, maintaining healthy boundaries and ways to use prayer and scripture in caring conversations.

The FPC Stephen Ministry group recently adopted a new model called Sustaining Care for care receivers whose life situation, in contrast to that of the traditional care receiver, is not expected

to change. There are many potential care receivers for whom there is no specific individual issue requiring resolution. Many members of our community need care, companionship and an opportunity to share their stories even in the absence of a specific crisis or loss. In that situation, Sustaining Caregivers can be relied upon to provide a ministry of presence and to walk alongside their care receivers as they discover the hope within their own narratives.

The reason that Sustaining Care is closely associated with Stephen Ministry is that many of the same principals and processes and much of the initial training and continuing education are adapted from Stephen Ministry materials. These are supplemented by current scholarship in pastoral care. Sustaining Caregivers and Stephen Ministers support and learn from one another in shared supervision and continuing education meetings. In fact, several of our Sustaining Caregivers are also Stephen Ministers who are available for either type of caring relationship depending on need.
