## **FPC Christmas Toy Store**

Saturday, December 14 (Setup day December 13)

The Christmas Toy Store is gearing up for another year of serving our families at Community Crossroads. The Toy Store will take place on Saturday, December 14 in the gym. Setup day is Friday, December 13 if you are available to help.

Please come by the Toy Store table outside of the worship areas to pick up stars and purchase toys, books and games for the age and gender on the stars, then return the toys to the boxes in front of the Great Hall or Narthex. You may also donate money and we'll do the shopping for you (checks may be made out to FPC with "Christmas toy store" in the memo line). We are asking for toys



for ages 3 to 10. We have an increase in families registering this year, so we anticipate we will need 850 toys, 420 books and 120 games. We provide two toys and one book per child, and one board game per family. As in the past, we'll have a suggestion list based on our experience in past toy stores. Also, remember that we are not providing socks, underwear, diapers, or any clothing. We ask that you bring the toys back to the marked boxes in front of the Great Hall or in the Narthex by Sunday, December 8.


## **Advent Labyrinth Walk**

## PASTOR'S LETTER

#### Dear Friends,

As we turn the calendar to December and our liturgical calendar to Advent, I pray that you are able to find some time this season to prepare for Christ's coming in meaningful ways. Advent and Christmas remind us that God makes a home within us, and we also remember that God makes a home in the world. So, to grow in Christ, we must travel both the inward and the outward journeys. The journey inward--which includes such practices as prayer, meditation, reflection, and keeping Sabbath--leads us to the indwelling God. The outward journey--expressed in acts of service, kindness, and justice--opens us to the God of compassion who loves all creation and especially identifies with the powerless and poor. A healthy spiritual life balances and integrates the inward and outward journeys, and there is no better time to cultivate this balance than in the season of Advent. Where can we nurture and offer hope, peace, joy and love in the world?

Our congregation offers many opportunities to practice these inward-outward disciplines together, in the context of a community of disciples. Journey inward each Sunday morning or Wednesday night in one of our worship services. Attend the Wednesday noon MidDay Prayer Service followed by an organ concert. Walk the labyrinth on December 1; come to Follow the Star on December 8; or enjoy the Advent Taize service on December 15. Journey outward by extending hospitality at Room in the Inn (starting December 9); being a driver for Christmas Party for the Blind on December 5; bringing toys and books for the Christmas Toy Store by December 9; or volunteering in the many ministries at Community Crossroads.

Advent is a beautiful season of both silence and service, worship and witness, for the inward-outward balance is, in fact, God's word incarnate in our lives and our world.

## **Highlights from the November Stated Session Meeting**

At its Stated Meeting of November 17, the Session:

- Sustained the examination of elders-elect and set the date for ordination/installation for January 12, 2020.
- Elected commissioners to the December 7 meeting of Grace Presbytery at Trinity - McKinney.
- Approved \$45,835 in grants from the Mission Outreach Committee to six ministries locally, nationally, and internationally.
- Approved Adult Church School teachers for the Winter Quarter (December- February).
- Elected Efton Park as Clerk of Session for 2020.
- Received a stewardship update that celebrated increased generosity from the congregation and began writing thank you notes.
- Heard an update from the Susan Beaumont Task Force that the December meeting will include a time for discussion of upcoming recommendations.
- Called a Congregational Meeting for December 8 following the 11 a.m. service to approve Clergy Terms of Call as recommended by the Personnel Committee.
- Received a common prayer from the Spiritual Formation Subcommittee and endorsed its use by the congregation and committees during the pastoral search.
- Prayed for church members and for former pastor Dana Jones and his family on the death of his wife, Kathy.

## Year-End Giving

Please keep the following guidelines in mind when planning your year-end giving to First Presbyterian.

You must deliver or mail (and postmark) checks on or by December 31, 2019, to claim a charitable contribution deduction for 2019. Although checks in the offering on the first Sunday in 2020 can be recorded to fulfill a 2019 pledge to the church, they will not qualify for an IRS charitable contribution deduction for 2019, even if the check is predated to 2019 or actually written in 2019. However, checks that are written, mailed, and postmarked in 2019 will be deductible, even though they were not received by the church until 2020. To ensure the deductibility of your church contributions under current IRS guidelines, please do not file your 2019 income tax return until you have received a written acknowledgement of your contributions from the church. Some of your contributions may not be tax deductible if you file your return before receiving a written acknowledgement of your contributions.

Note about Online Gifts: Online gifts will be credited according to the date and time the online gift is submitted.

## FPC'S STAINED GLASS, PART 3: THE SEVEN AISLE WINDOWS

Seven single lancet windows, each containing three sections, portray the main events in the life and ministry of Jesus. They are located on the south side of the sanctuary, under the south clerestory windows, and read from left to right as one faces them, with the subjects starting at the bottom and reading up.



#### Aisle Window 1 - The Advent

a. The Nativity – Shown is the infant Christ child in the manger, watched over by his mother Mary and by Joseph holding a lantern, while surrounding him are the ox and ass of the stable and a small lamb and two birds who have come in from out of doors.

b. The Shepherds – Tending their flock in the fields, the shepherds are frightened by the glory of the Lord who shone about them, and by the voice of the angel of the Lord proclaiming to them Christ's birth.

c. The Magi – The three wise men from the east are shown presenting their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to the Christ child who is seated on his mother's lap.

#### Aisle Window 2 - Childhood of Jesus

a. In the Temple – As a child Jesus was brought up in the traditions of the Jewish faith. Here, May and Joseph are bringing him to the Temple at Jerusalem at the age of twelve.

b. In the Temple with the Doctors – Here the twelve year old Jesus amazes the learned doctors with his understanding and answers their questions. This scene symbolizes the sanctity of learning.

c. In the Carpenter Shop – The boy Jesus is shown learning a trade under Joseph, while Mary his Mother sits in the background sewing. This scene symbolizes the dignity of labor.

#### Aisle Window 3 – Preparation and start of Ministry

a. Baptism – Our Lord is shown receiving baptism from John the Baptist, who is pouring water on his head as they stand in the river Jordan. Radiance from heaven streams down as the voice of God proclaims, "Thou art my beloved son, in whom I am well Pleased."

b. Temptation – The devil offers Christ all the kingdoms of the world and, having seated Him on a pinnacle of the temple of Jerusalem, tempts Him to cast Himself down and prove that He, as the Son of God, will remain unharmed.

c. Call of the Fishermen – Peter and Andrew are shown heeding the words of Jesus as he says, "Follow me and I will make you fishers of men."

#### Aisle Window 4 - Intimate Ministry

a. Christ and Nicodemus – They are shown on the rooftop at night as Nicodemus tries to comprehend Christ's words, "Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God."

b. The Woman of Samaria – Christ is shown talking to the woman at the well of living water that quenches all thirst.

c. In the Home of Lazarus at Bethany – Shown listening to Christ's words are Lazarus and his sisters, Martha who "was cumbered about much serving" and Mary who "hath chosen the good path, which shall not be taken away from her."

#### Aisle Window 5 - Public Ministry

a. The Sermon on the Mount – Christ is shown seated on the mountain, teaching his disciples the beatitudes and many other sayings.

b. Christ Blessing the Children – Our Lord is shown surrounded by adoring children as he says "Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of God." c. "Zaccheus, Come Down" – Zaccheus, chief among the

c. "Zaccheus, Come Down" – Zaccheus, chief among the publicans, is summoned down from the tree which he has climbed in order to see Jesus better, and told that he is to have Jesus as his guest.

#### Aisle Window 6 - Ministry of Healing

a. Healing a Man – Jesus is shown restoring sight to the blind beggar Bartimeus, whose faith made him whole (Mark 10.46-52).

b. Healing a Woman - Shown is the woman with an issue of blood whose faith was so great that merely by touching the hem of Jesus' garment in the crowd, she was healed.

c. Healing a Child – Jesus is pictured raising to life the daughter of Jairus, while her mother and father look on in astonishment.

#### Aisle Window 7 – Ministry of Miracles

a. The Marriage at Cana – In the presence of the bride and groom and of his own mother, Jesus turns the water into wine for the wedding feast.

b. Feeding the Five Thousand – The miracle is accomplished with the aid of a small lad who had brought five barley loaves and two small fishes. Jesus feeds the multitude and there are twelve baskets of bread fragments left over.

c. The Transfiguration – Jesus is pictured with his face shining "as the sun, and his raiment...white as the light" (Matthew 17.2). With him in glory are Moses and Elijah, talking of Jesus' approaching death. Not shown are the three disciples Peter, James and John, who witnessed the event.

Beautiful creches exist in all kinds of art forms, from wooden to porcelain to glass. If you have a nativity scene that you would be willing to share during advent, please bring them to the Communications office (across from the main office) by December 2. Please be sure to label them with your name and phone number. We will take very good care of them and they will be displayed in a locked cabinet.
