The Bible and Your Faith: Reading and Studying Scripture

First Presbyterian Church offers a variety of seminars, courses, workshops and small group experiences for reading and studying the Bible. From those who have never studied or read the Bible to those who have been reading and studying for years, opportunities exist for an ever growing and deepening encounter with scripture. In addition to on-going Church School classes, Presbyterian Women's Circles, and Men's Bible Study Groups, two opportunities this fall are described below. To register, visit fpcfw.org/bible. Reading the Bible in 9 Months

Daily Bible readings enable participants to read through the entire Bible in 9 months. Led by Dr. Michael Waschevski, monthly gatherings of those committed to reading through the Bible enrich the individual experiences of scripture. The *Reading the Bible in 9 Months* reading plan begins on Sunday, September 8. Reading plans are available on the church's website at fpcfw.org/bible.

Bible in Depth

This popular course is offered twice a week (choose one) on Sunday mornings from 10-10.45 a.m. and Wednesday mornings from 10.45 -11.45 a.m. Led by the Rev. Robyn Michalove (Sunday class) and Dr. Michael Waschevski (Wednesday class), a book of the Bible is studied verse by verse. Throughout the study participants grow in their understanding of scripture and its application to their daily life of faith. The fall session begins on Sunday, September 8, or Wednesday, September 11 with a study of Genesis.

JESUS AND NONVIOLENCE SMALL GROUP FORMING

Richard Rohr believes that most of us have missed entirely what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ. He says that we love to worship Jesus but are reluctant to actually follow him. Yet, he points out that Jesus never once said to would-be disciples, "Worship me!" while he quite frequently told them, "Follow me."

So what does it mean to follow him? In his book, *Jesus and Nonviolence*: A *Third Way*, Walter Wink suggests that Jesus preached and lived a nonviolent way of life and that understanding Jesus's ministry through the lens of nonviolence is crucial to our discipleship, since we are being called to live nonviolently also. Like Jesus, we are to practice this courageous, loving, faithful way of addressing injustice and the violence it spawns. Like Jesus, we are to work for the healing of the world.

Starting October 6 and extending through November

24, Martha Newman and Carol Toombs will lead a small group through Wink's book, using the JustMatters format: scripture, outside readings and videos, study, prayer, and dialogue. The group will meet Sunday afternoons from 1 - 3:30 p.m. for eight weeks. We will take a deeper look at the Gospels and at Jesus' example. We will meet modern day disciples like Martin Luther King and learn from modern research the surprising efficacy of this way of addressing violence and oppression. We will pray together, speak from the heart, learn from the wisdom of our authors and one another, and support one another in our personal growth.
